


FABULOUS FARCE Druid Theatre Company are giving us another chance to catch up on prolific playwright Enda Walsh's award-winning, The Walworth Farce, on its home run from London's National Theatre. A manicallypaced, bleak, funny and desperate masterpiece featuring the wonderful Denis Conway and a crossdressing Garrett Lombard, it's brilliantly directed by Mikel Murfi. Catch this Christmas blockbuster on its cross-country run from Town Hall Galway, December 3-6, to Project Dublin, December 8-20.

## OH YES IT IS!

Panto season, that is. Catch Peter Pan at the Tivoli from December 11; Cinderella at the Gaiety, from November 30; and, if you're feeling more literary, Charles Dickens favourite The Old Curiosity Shop opens at Dublin's Gate Theatre on December 3.

**LIGHT FANTASTIC** Tread lightly into the New Year with the National Gallery of Ireland's 108th annual exhibition of 31 dreamy Turner watercolours and drawings, A Light in the Darkness, January 1-31. Magically capturing the effect of light on locations like Venice's Grand Canal, The Doge's Palace, and Switzerland's Lake Lucerne, these delicate watercolours are only shown when natural light is at its weakest, so they retain their 19thcentury luminosity. This year, there's a dainty sideshow of 17th to 19th century silhouettes and miniatures, such as "Harriet Beecher Stowe (1811-1896), Novelist", and free public talks, visit





CLASS ACT Best known as Ross in the zeitgeist-encapsulating The Last Days of the Celtic Tiger, above, actor Rory Nolan (from Killiney, roysh), is in his element when I meet him for a chat in the Project auditorium. Why wouldn't he be? The Irish acting profession's answer to Brian O'Driscoll is one of the busiest, young actors in town.

Of embodying the moody Newman protagonist, Brick, in Corn Exchange's 2008 production of Cat On A Hot Tin Roof, he confides, "I love the excitement and the buzz of live performance. I love the fact that we are going to have 200 people here tonight, feeding off what we are doing, and we're going to be feeding off them. I love that interaction."

Over Christmas and New Year, the tall, well-built redhead is appearing in Roddy Doyle and Bisi Adigun's radical multicultural re-interpretation of Synge's classic, The Playboy of the Western World, on the site of its controversial 1907 conception - the Abbey Theatre, December 15 - January 31. "It is probably the great Irish play. I'll be playing Shawneen Keogh, Pegeen's suitor. He's a bit gormless.

"The diversity of roles is a gift and a challenge," he says of his eclectic repertoire, which has spanned the works of Shakespeare, Tennessee Williams, Paul Howard, Friedrich Schiller and Arthur Riordan's hit musical, Improbable Frequency, in which he also got to display his singing talent as wartime poet John Betjeman.

"It's a privilege to be constantly acting, and to be constantly on the job. To have such a diverse range of work is brilliant," he says of his career since cutting his teeth in UCD's Dramsoc, where he was auditor, and subsequent graduation from the Gaiety School of Acting in 2003. "I've been really lucky."

From where Rory is standing, "the state of Irish theatre is great - regardless of cuts." He waxes lyrical about theatre directors Lynne Parker of Rough Magic, Annie Ryan of Corn Exchange, Garry Hynes of Druid, Jimmy Fay, and Conall Morrison.

"It's the work that interests me for the moment, and wherever that takes me, that's where I'll be. I'd like to do more film and TV, but my great love is theatre. If I'm half as lucky as I've been over the past five years, I'll be happy."

TALES FROM THE SCRIPT Who hasn't hummed along to to "We Cry" (inspired by a stroll through Dublin's Liberties), or "The Man Who Can't Be Moved"? Talented and sexy innercity Dublin trio, The Script, possibly the hottest band to come out of Ireland since U2, took the UK and Ireland by storm with the release of their eponymous debut album earlier this year. Check out how they defy genres as they mix it up live from r 'n' b, to rock, folk, soul and hip-hop - at Dublin's Olympia Theatre on **December 16**. If you can still get a ticket, that is.

Byrne from Westlife, headlined by Boyzone, with Shayne Ward, Alphabeat, The Saturdays, Scouting for Girls, The Script and Enrique Iglesias. No expense or detail - such as special accoustic tiling - has been spared to ensure optimum sound quality in this, Europe's first custom-designed venue for live music. Coldplay, Kings of Leon, Counting Crows and New Kids on the Block are among the first acts to christen the arena in its opening season. Complete with a translucent

roof, set to light up like a futuristic blue beacon on the Liffey, the sky is the limit for the

capital's newest pleasure dome.
