As well as world cinema, documentary panorama, and a thoughtful retrospective on the world of Liverpudlian director Terence Davies (*Distant Voices*, *Still Lives* and *Of Time And The City*), Cork shines its light this year on Mexican short films, Irish filmmaking duo Desperate Optimists, and presents an interesting talk by controversial arthouse film director Peter Greenaway (*The Cook, The Thief, His Wife and Her Lover* and *Prospero's Books*). ONSCREEN "I play a down-on-his-luck actor. I didn't have to do too much research," jokes Dubliner Mark Doherty, pictured above far right, writer of black farce A Film With Me In It, above, a quirky road movie that has been compared to Withnail and I and which has wowed audiences at Galway, Edinburgh and Toronto Film Festivals so far, and is set for general release later this month. Doherty, one of Ireland's top comic talents, wrote the script ("it emerged"), with Dylan Moran, pictured centre, of Black Books, in mind. "My best friend is a scriptwriter, played by Dylan Moran. We find ourselves in this very dark place with no way out, where things seem to be going against us. It seems to be like a quirky comedy. His life is falling apart, and then, about a third of the way through, it takes a sharp turn left." Along with Amy Huberman and Aisling O'Sullivan, Neil Jordan also features, typecast as a film director. "He's really good," offers Mark, who reciprocated by playing a part in Jordan's new film, Ondine. Son of jazz musician Jim Doherty, and brother of stand-up comedian David O'Doherty, Mark has naturally been

"living on the fringes", for more than a decade - doing the stand-up comedy circuit until 2000, acting in low-budget feature films like November Afternoon, by John Carney (recently catapulted into Oscar-land with Once) and Tom Hall, and writing alternative projects for television. Apart from Doherty's 2004 play, Trad, which was an international success, his offbeat sense of humour can often be found at 11pm on RTE 2: "It's a graveyard slot. That's where I live." As A Film With Me In It takes off, Doherty is "writing a television show with Barry Murphy, my collaborator for years on telly projects. Last year we did Soupy Norman. We bought ten episodes of a Polish soap opera, re-cut the pictures. overdubbed the whole thing and created our own little ten-minute stories about a dysfunctional Cork family and a girl who moves to Dublin." Ridiculous? "It was a bit of a cult hit." Mark declares himself "happy to be mixing it all up, and spreading myself thinly. So nobody can suss me," he laughs. "It has worked so far."

oll out the red carpet to welcome Ireland's first ever custom-built opera house for its inaugural **Wexford Festival Opera season**, **October 16 - November 2**. Nestled into the quaint seaside town of Wexford, this skyline-changing building, left, "an incredible feat of engineering that blossoms upwards", is a rather breathtaking triumph. Designed by international award-winning Keith Williams & Associates architects, it's a fitting home to Wexford Festival Opera, which, since 1951, has been providing us not only with a great opportunity to dress up, but also to catch a close-up glimpse of up-andcoming international opera stars. Known for staging long-forgotten masterpieces by famous composers, the 2008 season marks the centenary of Russian composer Rimsky-Korsakov's death, by staging his little-known gem, *Snegurochka*, a version of the traditional Russian folktale, *The Snow Maiden*. There will be Gothic opera, with *The Mines of Sulphur* by British composer Sir Richard Rodney Bennett (*Four Weddings and a Funeral*), and comic opera, poking a bit of fun at the opera world itself, with Carlo Pedrotti's Tutti in Maschera (*Everyone in Disguise*). Amid the 50 events on offer across the 18-day festival are short works by Puccini, Rossini, Menotti, and Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. For more, www.wexfordopera.com.
